
SOUTH LAKE UNION // THIS IS WHERE THE 'BOOM' BEGINS.



ISTORY Pioneer David Denny staked his claim in the South Lake Union neighborhood in 1853. That claim included much of what is now the South Lake Union neighborhood, though it also included the location where Seattle Center now stands (which is not a part of the neighborhood). In 1882, the Lake Union and Lumber Company established a sawmill on the south shore of the lake. At the time, the body of water extended all the way south to what is now the corner of Mercer and Westlake. The mill would last well into the 20th century, finally closing in 1988, but during that time South Lake Union saw great industrial and commercial growth including Seattle City Light's Hydro House, the Lake Union Steam Plant, and the first Ford Model T assembly plant west of the Mississippi.
