
WEST SEATTLE // A PART OF THE CITY AND APART FROM THE CITY.



ISTORY The first European settlers, led by Arthur Denny, landed in this area in 1851 at the mouth of the Duwamish River in what would later become West Seattle. In what might be known as the first modern instance of Seattle weather laying claim to someone's emotions, the landing party split into two factions after weathering (pun intended) a harsh winter. The settlers who stayed named their new home New York Alki. The residence of both parties competed for dominance for a number of years. During that time West Seattle's unique community was born.

Of the original settlers, only Charles C. Terry and John and Lydia Low and their families remained. With the slow growth of the area, they dropped New York and kept only Alki, a Hudson Bay trapper jargon word meaning "by and by" or "in a while," but eventually even they would give up and move on to Seattle. By and by, rail lines were gradually added, the first of several incarnations of the West Seattle Bridge was built, and then finally a steam-powered side-wheeler allowed an 8-minute crossing to Alki. An area that was, at first, considered too harsh an environment became one of the most exciting developments in Seattle.
