

HISTORY: During the mid-1800s, the Central District was quickly developed and considered an ideal place due to its proximity to what was becoming Seattle’s main business district. Quick logging and the installation of cable cars led to a great number of homes being built, many of which still stand as historical landmarks today.

Throughout history, the area has been home to different cultural groups beginning as a predominantly Jewish neighborhood, giving way to Japanese-American residents prior to World War II, and finally becoming the hotbed for the Seattle Civil Rights movement through the 60s.

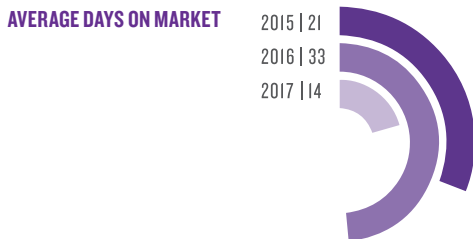

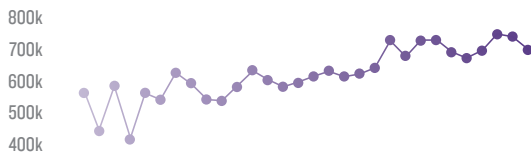
What you will find is a proud heritage of cultural awareness that informs the Seattle art and music scenes and, more recently, the theater and dance scenes, as they grow into their own.

MEDIAN SOLD PRICE



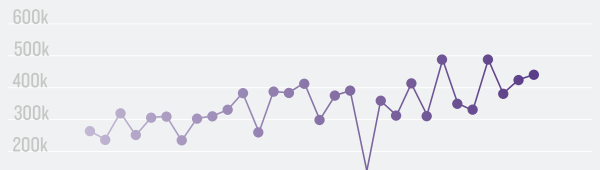
MONTHS OF INVENTORY
